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### \*CONFERENCES\*

Chief Engineer Mackey conferred with the Board at 2:15 o'clock P.M. regarding proposed agreement with Generazzio regarding changing the course of the Sudbury River to eliminate the Ox Bow in Saxonville. The agreement will require that water will be available to sand and gravel pits. The State Division of Waterways will pay the entire cost of constructing a new channel. The Chief Engineer was instructed to get letters from the Division of Waterways and SUASCO approving it and also to prepare his own written opinion.

Fire Chief Trevett conferred with the Board at 2:40 P.M. regarding firefighter Edward Murphy who has been on sick leave. Mr. Murphy has been instructed to report to Dr. Levenson for a physical examination October 23, 1956.

Dennis Connolly, a visiting pharmacist from Tipperary, Ireland, visited with the Board briefly at 2:45 P.M.

Building Inspector Ayer informed the Board that Carey Auto Parts are operating a used car lot at the rear of 115 Beaver St. without either a Junk License or a Used Car Dealer's License. He has informed them that they must go to the Zoning Board of Appeals and has instructed them to stop operations pending the decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Joseph Lewis, Esq., conferred with the Board at 4 P.M. and presented a diagram of proposed traffic painting by the Arrow Electric Co. on Howard and Freeman Streets. It was decided to refer the matter to Police Chief McCarthy for an investigation, and Attorney Lewis will be notified of any decision made by the Board.

### \*HEARINGS\*

A public hearing was held at 2:30 P.M., in the Selectmen's Office, Room 21, Memorial Building, on the petition of the New Eng. Tel. & Tel. Co. for one pole on Central Street, southeasterly side, from a point approximately 508' northeast of Fenwick Street. Attorney Randall represented Harry Mason, an abutter, but did not object to the pole location. The Board granted this petition.

A public hearing was held at 2:30 P.M., in the Selectmen's Office, Room 21, Memorial Building, on the petition of the New Eng. Tel. & Tel. Co., for two pole locations on Central Street, westerly side, approximately 1081' northerly from Edgell Road. No one was present in favor of, or in opposition to, the granting of this petition, and the same was granted.

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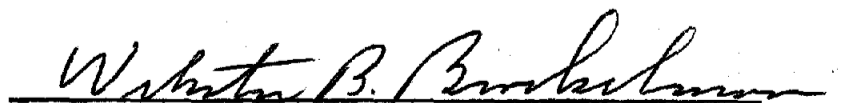
A public hearing was held at 3 o'clock P.M. in the Selectmen's Office, Room 21, Memorial Building, to consider the petition of Raytheon Manufacturing Company that it be given a special permit, pursuant to Section XVI of the Building By-Laws, to construct a 100' high antenna tower on Nobscot Hill. Wellington F. Scott, Esq., Charles H. Pesnick, Esq., Paul J. Pontecorvo, Manager of the Communications Section, Everett W. Reed, Assistant Manager Communications Section of Raytheon, represented the petitioner. Attorney Scott stated that they wished the permit to erect a 100' high antenna tower for micro wave communications only. Very high frequency will be used and will not interfere with local transmission or reception. The tower will be constructed of steel, and will be of the strongest type available. The tower will be erected on land owned by Jewett and Alyce Hulbert which has been leased by the Raytheon Manufacturing Company for two years, with renewal options. The preliminary work has already been started and the entire project will be finished within a week or two. The tower meets all requirements of the Building Department, and it is structurally sound and well anchored. Mr. Pontecorvo stated there will be absolutely no interference with local transmission or reception inasmuch as the transmission uses a lower voltage and a higher frequency than is possible for ordinary transmission. All radiation will be beamed directly at the tower. Raytheon Manufacturing Company is using similar antennas all over the country and have had no problems. Attorney Scott assures the Board Raytheon will fence the entire area to prevent children from approaching the tower and possibly injuring themselves. It was voted to grant the request of Raytheon Manufacturing Company and to instruct the Building Inspector to issue the necessary permit.

\*NO LIQUOR SALES\*

It was voted that there would be no sale of liquor on Election Day, November 6, until 8 P.M.
