EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Executive Session was held with Personnel Director, Dana Burdette and Police Chief Arthur F. Martins relating to the current status in collective bargaining with various town groups, and in particular, the Police Department.

The Board met in Executive Session with Purchasing Agent, Richard J. McNamara for discussion of his request for approval on the establishment of the position of Assistant Purchasing Agent. After due consideration regarding the personnel structure in the office of the Purchasing Agent, the Board unanimously approved his request to establish the position of Assistant Purchasing Agent, S-8 capacity, as well as an additional C-1 position. He was advised to consult with the Personnel Board as to the course of action to be taken to implement these changes.

DENNISON AVENUE WIDENING:

The Board met with Public Works Commissioners, Chairman Anthony Colonna and John Jordan; Director of Public Works, Primo Silva; Merchants at the corner of Dennison Avenue and Concord St., and Sergeant Robert Foley to discuss the many problems resulting from inadequate parking in this area. Present also were Donald Burlingame-Dom's Hair Stylist; Samuel Hurwitz-Hurwitz Kosher Meat Market; Wilfred E. Ash, Manager-Cumberland Farms and Samuel Landy-Landy's Laundry. The problems resulting from inadequate parking were discussed in detail. Mr. Ash noted that his store attracted five minute shoppers, however, his business had dropped because it was impossible to park there. Often times customers at the Hair Stylist were parked in the area for several hours. Further, his problems were compounded by Dr. Slade's customers who parked in front of his store even though Dr. Slade provided parking for his customers in the rear of his property. The merchants suggested

widening Dennison Avenue at the corner to provide angle parking. They felt this would alleviate the problem somewhat. Also discussed was the possibility of parking on the opposite side of Dennison Avenue. Mr. Colonna indicated that angle parking would be beneficial. He noted this plan would only provide parking for a few cars, and also there would have to be an allowance of 14' from the corner or there would be a hang over from the sidewalk. He suggested either making Dennison Avenue a one-way street to Warren Road or permitting parking on both sides of the street. Chairman Kind indicated the neighbors could be affected by this plan, therefore, they should be contacted regarding this plan. Mr. Landy asked about the possibility of a traffic light at the corner of Dennison Avenue. He was advised by Sergeant Foley that this was being considered under the Topics Plan, however, would be a long time in coming. Upon the motion of Chairman John King it was unanimously voted to submit an article for the Annual Town Meeting for traffic lights at Dennison Ave. and Concord St. It was also suggested that a similar Article should be submitted for Mt. Wayte Ave. and Union Avenue.

ARLINGTON STREET: - This matter was also discussed at the above joint meeting. In an attempt to solve the congested parking area on and around Arlington Street, possible plans were offered as a solution. Chairman Anthony Colonna (Public Works) suggested that Arlington St. be made one way from Irving St. to Waushakum. He also suggested that no parking be allowed on Arlington St. (He noted many of the "parkers" were residents on the street with available parking in the rear of their homes.) Sergeant Foley suggested the possible use of the old school lot on Gordon St. for parking. He felt if the fence were moved back and the area hot-topped, additional parking would be available. Selectman DelPrete suggested the Park Department be consulted on this plan as he felt it was under their jurisdiction. Town Counsel, Aaron Bikofsky explained this was school property. He reported the Park Department had inherited it when the school was no longer in use, however, he felt they would be happy to cooperate - although, they would hope to retain a portion of it. Sergeant Foley was asked to investigate this plan fully.

DRUG COMMISSION SURVEY:

Town Counsel reported that Dr. Matarese had contacted him regarding the preparation of an agreement between the Drug Commission and Project Prep relative to a survey which will be conducted. Pursuant to a question raised by Dr. Matarese, Town Counsel asked the Board if there was a maximum "dollar figure" set for the proposal. He noted that Project Prep, the group conducting the survey, estimated it would cost in the vicinity of \$3800 to \$4200, for an anticipated 12 weeks work with two or three people conducting the survey. Dr. Matarese, he said, was under the impression that a maximum of \$3500 had been set. The Board indicated that they had not discussed the actual cost involved, and it was agreed by them this should be left to the discretion of the Drug Commission.

MT. WAYTE AVE.-NEWTON PARK ROAD:

The Board approved the recommendation of Safety Officer Sergeant Robert Foley to request the Public Works Department to refinish a section of land on Newton Park Road to make turning movement easier for buses. Sgt. Foley advised he would ask Mr. Silva, Director of Public Works to look into this possibility.

ROUTE 9 LIGHTING (LEGISLATION):

The Board acknowledged receipt of a letter from Senator Edward L. Burke in which he advised that he and Representatives Nickinello and Golden have filed legislation to direct the State Department of Public Works to install lighting from Speen St. in Natick to the Edgell Road overpass, and from Temple St. to the Framingham-Southboro town line. The Board's appreciation will be extended Senator Burke for his cooperation.

LA CANTINA, INC:

The Board unanimously approved the request of Lee Mencoboni of La Cantina, Inc. to remain open until 2:00 A.M. on New Year's Eve.

STREET ACCEPTANCE-ANNUAL TOWN MEETING:

Recommendations for street acceptance for the Annual Town Meeting were received from the Public Works Department, Engineering Department, Planning Board and Tree Department. All departments were in agreement with the recommended streets, with the exception of Gryzboska Circle (Tree) and Lyman Road (Engineering). Mrs. Gherna was instructed to investigate the status of tree planting on Gryzboska Circle and the Engineering problem on Lyman Road. Pending clarification, the Board will at a future date make recommendation to the Engineering Department.

EXTENSION OF CLOSING HOUR - "400" RESTAURANT:

The Board acknowledged receipt of a request from the "400" Restaurant for a 1:00 A.M. closing. Prior to granting permission, abutters will be contacted to see if they have any objection to the closing time.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING - SCHOOL:

The matter of a Special Town Meeting which had been set for January 26, 1972 at the request of the School Committee, and talbed because of conflict with the Finance Committee, was discussed briefly. Pursuant to discussions held between those two departments there was some indication that the meeting could be held two weeks later than originally called. Executive Secretary was instructed to confer with Dr. Benson for further clarification.

MALINE-MANCUSO SIDEYARD VARIANCE:

Town Counsel reported that he had spoken with Mrs. Maline regarding the settlement that had been reached between Messrs. Livoli and Mancuso and she was satisfied that the matter was finally resolved. Mr. Bikofsky asked her to formally withdraw her request for a sideyard variance in order that the Board could consider the matter closed.

SCHOOL VANDALISM:

The November report on vandalism in the Framingham Schools was viewed by the Board. Selectman Ablondi stressed that more stringent steps be taken to curtail vandalism in the schools in light of the 25% deductible clause. The School Committee will be asked to take procedures to see that this is curtailed. So Voted.

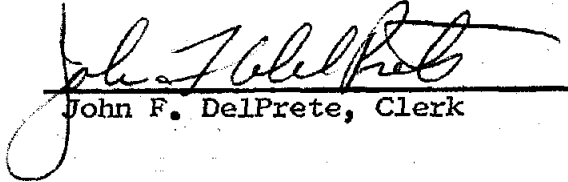
DOG KENNEL:

Selectman Peter Ablondi asked Town Counsel if the Board could "take" the dog kennels presently located on Site B of Macomber Property, recently acquired for conservation by Town Meeting Action. He explained that he had viewed the kennels on the premises and found this would be an excellent solution insofar as location for the Town's Dog Pound. He noted this action would save the Town a great deal of money if this facility were used, rather than building a new pound. Further, he felt the existing kennels could be "fixed up" nicely with the assistance of the Boy Scouts.

Town Counsel indicated inasmuch as the Selectmen are the agents by which the purchase will be executed, he felt this action could be taken. However, he indicated a better approach would be to work out some sort of agreement with the Conservation Commission for this portion of Macomber B. He noted the government interpretation of "conservation purposes" could be different if this course of action were pursued. Mr. Bikofsky said he would discuss the use of the kennels with Mrs. Silverberg of the Conservation Commission, and also, he would speak with the Trustees for permission to immediately start repair work on the present kennel buildings.

Dog Officer Paul Gosselin was present, stressing the urgency of a facility to house dogs. He reported the existing facility was totally inadequate, and has been the subject of criticism from the S.P.C.A. He concurred with the recommended use of Macomber B kennels. Mr. Gosselin advised the Board that he could not continue in his present capacity if action wasn't taken soon as he encountered too many problems with the present set-up. Chairman King said he appreciated the problem Mr. Gosselin had and explained the Board was working as quickly as possible, however, it would take time to reach an agreement with the Conservation Commission. Upon the suggestion of Selectman DelPrete, the Board voted unanimously to discontinue the use of the phrase "dog pound" in favor of the phrase "town kennel".
