### CONFERENCE - SAM SWISHER RE: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM - PROCUREMENT OF PROVIDERS:

Mr. Sam Swisher, Community Development Coordinator, stated that he would like to bring the Board up to date on the anticipated level of funding for the Community Development Block Grant Program for the next fiscal year and to describe a process which the Community Development Committee would recommend be followed in securing providers and activities and with the Board's concurrence, he would be prepared to act with the Planning Department to set up a request of proposals. Ms. Doris Sarkisian of the Community Development Committee would have been in attendance but was unable to because of health reasons.

He stated that basically in the coming program year, the 16th year of the Block Grant, the year that begins July 1, 1990 and runs until June 30, 1991, the town would be anticipating approximately \$470 to \$475,000 available to support the activities that can be run through the Block Grant. That sum would be made up of approximately \$430,000 in new allocations from the Federal government this year and that represents about a 3 to 4% cut in funding from the Federal government's over last year. Other parts of the sum of money available to support activities would come from program income from the repayment of loans and grants made through the Housing Rehabilitation Programs over the years. That would be about another \$25,000. And, lastly we would estimate about \$20,000 or so in carryover in unexpended funds from prior fiscal years. That would put the grant again about in the range of \$475,000. Those numbers aren't final, they apparently are not going to be able to release to us from the Federal government, the final allocation levels until toward the end of this month. As a first step in the process each year of planning for the use of funds, there is a requirement by regulation that there be a Needs Hearing, kind of an open hearing to invite members of the community to raise concerns and discuss what they think are the community's most pressing community development needs and such a hearing was held about two weeks ago. It was one of the larger turnouts in recent years. In some senses, maybe that's an indication of the fact that public monies are scarce these days and that there is a doubled concern with the good use of any monies that would be available to the town. There was a broad range of program need discussed at that meeting ranging from the need to support housing rehabilitation and other housing programs. The consideration that the town may or may not wish to support literacy training programs, English As A Second Language activities were recommended, the need for perhaps enhancing the Drug Awareness activities and programs within the town was cited as well as a number of projects recommended by town departments such as the Department of Parks & Recreation, around upgrading some of the park facilities that are on target neighborhoods in town and a number of projects by the Department of Public Works. The committee, in recognition of the great diversity of the different types of needs and potential projects proposed would recommend to the Board of Selectmen that an Open Ended request of proposal process be the method to bring these proposals forward and to more concrete plans and descriptions. That has been the standard way of operating that the committee has recommended over several years now and the recommendation would be that a request for proposals be opened up, that town departments and other community agencies be invited to submit proposals in all permitted areas under the Block Grant to include Public Works, to include public facilities improvements, public services, architectural barriers removal project, housing and other Block Grant related activities. Should the Board concur, the Planning Department would open proposals in a week's time and seek to have them returned by the second week in January and then the Committee would function again to review and make recommendations to the Board of Selectmen through the end of the month of January and February and bringing a set of recommendations to the Board for its consideration in probably late February or early March for further deliberation on those activities.

Selectman Ernst stated that he thinks that in a year that we're facing, the State is cutting back and the Town may very well be cutting back. He was not sure that this is a year to be taking on new and additional projects. In his opinion, you should be looking at maybe funding the budgets of S.M.I.L.E.S., Trinity Mental Health, Youth Guidance Program and funding those in the Community Development who would do two things. It will help us in dealing with our main budget because it will eliminate those and anything else along that line, and he thinks those three things because he thought they would qualify under the rules of the Community Development Project.

Selectman DelPrete stated that there is definitely going to be cuts from the State and the Town. He feels we should look as to what is the best benefit we have got from the dollar we have invested. What are we getting the most for helping. The most people we can help with the fewest dollars that we have to. This is what we should be looking into.

He stated that English as a Second Language - teaching english to some of the people that have settled in here where they have come to this country and they don't have an education in our schools but they do need help in conversing in the English language. Once they can learn the language, it means they are going to be a viable part of our society and go out and work and be able to take part in our society. He feels that we should be doing everything we can to assist. He does not think we should look at any new programs as much and as worthy as they are because we have so many now. He feels that the Drug Program is something the Federal government should be doing with their Police Enforcement agencies. There should be money coming back

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for that area. We should be looking at safety aspects within the town as far as crosswalks.

Selectman King asked under public improvements, the bank building to the rear of the Memorial Building, he thinks there is a possibility that the town could acquire that. Is there any way that Block Grant funds could be used for the purpose of purchasing the building. He stated that some time ago, we tried to use Block Grant funds to buy the land to the rear of this building and he thought on 2 or 3 occasions, when we submitted articles to the Annual Town Meeting to use the Block Grant Program for that purpose, Town Meeting decided not to use the funds because they felt that the bank would never sell the property off, which they eventually did. Now we have a great opportunity to do something with that building in the rear of this building and I think the only way that the town would be in a position to do that is to use Block Grant funds.

The other matter is the Hollis Street Fire Station. We have over the years, used Block Grant funds for various types of improvements to the Hollis Street Fire Station and it was his understanding that there are some code violations at Hollis Street and he thought some of the funds could be used for that purpose if Sam Swisher felt that both projects would meet the requirements of the law.

Sam Swisher stated that the question about using the funds for acquisition was something that he felt he would need to look into before giving a complete answer.

Selectman King stated that when we tried to acquire the property to the rear of this building some years ago, Mr. DelPrete can verify this, that it was permissible because we submitted the article at least 2 or 3 times to Town Meeting. He didn't know for the purchase of a complete building such as the building to the rear of this building, whether that would qualify or not, but it's worth checking on because that opportunity will not be there forever and eventually we are going to have to expand the Police Department and if we had that building we would be in a much better position to go forward with those plans.

Sam Swisher will check on both matters and get back to the Board.

Sam Swisher also stated that one of the things the town would have to look at carefully in terms of use of the Block Grant is, especially in the public services area, the human services, social services area, there is a very strong concern written into the Block Grant regulations that any Block Grant funding that the town receive not be used to support an activity which had received town funding or local funding in the 12 months prior to the beginning of the new Block Grant fiscal year. There is a way of using that money for such a service if it can be looked at as supporting a new service or an expansion in service, but there are some regulatory issues to look at, which of course we would look at in respect to the prospect of funding some of these services. He would also like to look at and get back to the Board. He believed that many of the projects of the type that the Block Grant has supported in the past and has supported this year would be seeking renewed funding. There are a number of new projects and he understood the concern about using the money to help support activities approved effectiveness, ones that have been demonstrated in effectiveness and he, perhaps could see that maybe there should be a limitation on new projects or, if not that, then maybe a waiting system that invites some new but gives emphasis to continuity in continuation.

Selectman Ernst asked if the carryover of \$20,000 was from the Rehabilitation Program.

Sam Swisher stated that it was from a combination of factors, but largely comes from the fact that they had unexpended money related to a Public Works project undertaken on the south side. The Waverly Street water main installation was able to be done at a cost to the town which was considerably less than was estimated. It was a very competitive bidding process, quite a good price well below estimate and that freed up some funds.

Selectman Ernst asked how the Rehabilitation Program was in general. Was it on a reducing basis.

Sam Swisher stated that the Rehabilitation Program seems to be at about the same level of demand. They had changed the program within the last three years to have still the grant for assistance to people in greatest need for service but have been loaning the balance of funds in the grant and we are seeing some repayments now on a regularly scheduled loan basis. There is still a pretty substantial demand for the program. The \$25,000 income factor cited is growing and that was their plan in going to a loan program to have some revenue generated to help buffer the grant when cuts come along from the Federal level. In short, their feeling has been that there is still a pretty significant demand for the services of the Rehabilitation Program.

CORRESPONDENCE FROM FIRE CHIEF MICHAEL SMITH RE: FIRE LIEUTENANT PROMOTION:

Chief Michael Smith stated that he would like to request additional 4 new Lieutenants for the organizational structure of the Fire Department. In September, we implemented a re-organization of the department to reflect reduced manning level within the department and one of the areas that came to their attention immediately was the fact that of all the overtime it was very difficult to control the officer overtime. There is a clause in the contract that calls for a minimum of 6 company grade officers. What that means is once 2 officers are out on any one shift, it automatically trips an overtime situation. In 1980, when the Management Study was done in the department, at that time it was suggested that 4 company grade officers be added in an effort to reduce the overtime. The Chief agrees with that study. One of the other benefits is having 4 additional company grade officers would allow one additional officer per shift. It would add significantly to the control of the department. It would allow 2 company grade officers at each of the large stations which would make for a better run organization.

One of the added benefits if these promotions are made is for the first time, 3 out of the 4 top candidates for promotion are EMTI's. If these men are promoted, it would allow us for the first time to have a chain of command within the EMS system itself, which is something that has been needed. He feels that this is an opportunity where we could utilize skills that they have invested in these gentlemen thru long training and hard study. The cost as compared to the cost of overtime is insignificant. We have already exceeded

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the cost to what it would cost to promote these officers for next year. In a five month period, it has cost already \$15,000 to maintain the officer manpower. This year would cost \$10,476 and for FY/91 it would be \$15,000. It would be a substantial reduction in the overtime and an increase in efficiency at the same time.

Selectman DelPrete stated that he had no problem with it because of budget constraints that we could be facing. This is one way where within the contract you do have to call back the officer, the rationale of using them as an EMT where you would have a Lieutenant in charge is good sound thinking. He was very happy that the Chief put the time and have thought along these lines. He commended the Chief for doing the job of making this proposal the way it was presented with the backup material.

Selectman Ernst asked if this was implemented in the next month or so, what would be the cost for the balance of the year.

Chief Smith stated about \$7,000 for the balance and the funds are available.

Selectman Ernst asked if overtime was a separate item.

Chief Smith stated that it used to be. It was combined last year. They reduced from a 37 man to a 35 manpower.

Selectman Ernst agreed with the proposal.

The Executive Administrator concurred with the Chief's recommendation. It makes a lot of sense and commended him on a fine job.

Selectman King stated that the only concern he would have is that we get approval from the Personnel Board and Finance Committee.

He also asked under the Manpower Clause in the contract you have to have 35 firefighters and 6 company grade officers on duty on each shift for the purposes of this section a Deputy Chief or an Acting Deputy Chief shall be included in the 35 man minimum. Can't we have Acting Lieutenants and Acting Captains.

The Chief stated they do all the time.

Selectman King stated that means that as long as we have either Acting or Permanent Officers that meets the language intent of that section. Wasn't there an Arbitration case on that one time.

The Chief stated that he thought it was ruled in favor of it. It has to be 6 company grade officers.

Selectman King stated if you had an Acting Officer on a shift he would have to be in there for an extended period of time in order for that section to qualify.

Chief Smith stated that if he has one officer they make an Acting Officer. If they have 2 officers out, then they have to hire.

Selectman King asked the Executive Administrator to check on this and get back to the Chief.

RECOMMENDATION OF SAFETY OFFICER RE: NO LEFT TURN SIGN ON CONCORD STREET AT MECHANIC STREET:

Selectman King stated that this wouldn't work because the people who live on Mechanic Street and the lower end of Danforth Street, particularly in the row houses, there is no way they can get into their homes unless they go down Concord Street and somewhere along Concord Street, make a U-Turn and come back up and take a right into Mechanic Street. There is No Left Turn into Danforth Street so if they come down next to Mechanic Street there will be No Left onto Mechanic Street so the only way they could get into their street is to go down and continue on down Concord Street and somewhere down Concord Street, make a U-Turn and come back and take a right into Mechanic Street. This would restrict all the people that live on Mechanic Street and the lower end of Danforth Street as they travel south on Concord Street.

The Board tabled the matter.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF SAFETY OFFICER RE: STOP FOR PEDESTRIANS AT CROSSWALKS SIGNS (2) ON WARREN ROAD:

The Board voted the installation of Stop For Pedestrians At Crosswalks:

1. On Warren Road opposite Oaks Road for eastbound traffic.
2. On Warren Road 100 feet east of Flagg Drive for westbound traffic.

REQUEST FROM ITALIAN AMERICAN WAR VETERANS CLUB AT 35 SOUTH STREET TO MODIFY THEIR HOURS OF OPERATION FOR CHRISTMAS PARTIES:

The Board voted unanimously to grant permission to the Italian American War Veterans Club to remain open until 1:00 A.M. for Christmas parties.

REQUEST FROM MOLLY EVANS FOR AN APPOINTMENT TO THE FRAMINGHAM HISTORICAL COMMISSION:

The Board voted to appoint Stephen Herring, 69 Chouteau, Framingham for a term to expire May 1, 1991.

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CORRESPONDENCE FROM TOWN OF NORTHBOROUGH RE: RATE INCREASE PROPOSAL - MASSACHUSETTS TURNPIKE:

Selectman John DelPrete moved that the Board support the Town in their move because it's just another hidden tax that the Massachusetts residents will be paying.

Selectman King asked the Executive Administrator to send a letter to the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority voicing the Board's objection to an increase in the toll fees.

Memo from Jim Gavin, Director of Veterans Services.

The Executive Administrator stated that a letter was received from the Executive Office of Administration and Finance in reference to the funding of the Framingham Centre Project, parking project. The State has allocated \$82,000 towards the project. In his meeting with the Planning Department, it was pointed out that we are approaching the project on a piece meal basis, that is we've got enough work to be done for \$82,000 so that we don't over expend the budget. This will come down in future years, the remaining of the funding will come forth and the project will be outlined in such a way that we will be able to live within the budget. This year we will do \$82,000 worth of work there.

Selectman Ernst asked about the closing of the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting.

The Executive Administrator stated that in the past a memo has been sent by the Executive Administrator that the Warrant be closed on December 15th of each year. He asked the secretary to prepare a memo that would close the warrant on December 31st or the 28th which is a couple extra weeks. From his understanding, the Finance Committee likes to have the financial articles in by the middle of December. There is a need that maybe to keep the warrant open for non financial articles until maybe the middle of February before we send it out for printing. He has indicated that the warrant will close, at least in terms of financial articles, by the end of the month.
